

What is the NJFC Scholars Program?

The NJFC Scholars Program provides funding for eligible youth who have experienced a DCP&P out-of-home placement, DCP&P independent living arrangement, transitional living program or homelessness and are seeking a post-secondary degree at an accredited two-year or four-year college or university, or a vocational/technical program.

Who is eligible? Applicants must meet ONE of the following:	Funding
Have been in the care and custody of NJ Department of Children and Families Child Protection & Permanency (formerly DYFS), in an out-of-home placement for a cumulative of 9 months or more following the youth's 16th birthday	Federal ETV or State Tuition Waiver
Have been in an out-of-home placement for a cumulative of 18 months or more following the youth's 14th birthday	Federal ETV
Reside in or have resided in an independent living arrangement, or Transitional Living Program for three months or more	
*The facility or program must be established, operated or approved for payment by New Jersey DCP&P, the federal government pursuant to the Runaway & Homeless Youth Act or New Jersey Homeless Youth Act.	State Tuition Waiver
Be adopted through New Jersey DCP&P following the youth's 12th birthday	State Option or Federal ETV
Have been in a DCP&P out-of-home placement and left to enter KLG following the youth's 16th birthday	Federal ETV

What can funding be used for?

There are two funding sources:
Students who are eligible for the Federal Education
Training Voucher/State Option funding may receive assistance with the following:

- Tuition & Fees
- Room & Board
- Books & Supplies
- Transportation
- Special Equipment & Computers
- Child Care Costs

Students who are eligible for the **State Tuition Waiver** program may receive assistance with *tuition and fees* (does not include room and board) after federal financial aid has been applied.

The students personal status will determine the source of funding, and what services the scholarship will pay for.

What is required to apply?

Applicants must meet all of the following requirements:

- Be between the ages of 16 and 22
- Be in possession of a high school diploma or certificate of high school equivalency (GED)
- Be granted admission to a degree or certificate granting post-secondary institution or program that has been accredited to receive Title IV funding
- Have completed the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
